A NOTE FROM WITHIN

A STRONG FOUNDATION

Public versus private. Type I, Type II or Type III. Foundations are often tricky things to explain – at least without an IRS tax code manual and dictionary in hand. Most non-profit organizations have development departments charged with fundraising to further the organization's mission. For many years, Center for Hospice Care operated on that model. Assuring that Center for Hospice Care can fulfill its 33-year-old promise that no one eligible for hospice care is ever turned away, regardless of ability to pay, has been, and will always be, our primary concern. But as we grew and our mission broadened to include other educational and advocacy issues, a new model became necessary.

In 2007, Hospice Foundation (technically a Type II supporting foundation) was formed to support the work of Center for Hospice Care – and engage in activities that encourage awareness of hospice, palliative care and end-of-life issues in our eight-county service area and around the world. As the cover story further explains, we have four primary areas of focus: fundraising, stewardship, collaboration and education.

In this issue of Crossroads, you'll find examples of each of these. Walk for Hospice and Bike Michiana for Hospice are two of our largest fundraising activities. The three Notre Dame students who undertook internships in Uganda this summer illustrate both our collaborative endeavors as well as our education component. The donor display being created for our new Mishawaka campus is just one example of our stewardship.

We also work hard to make sure our supporters understand how their gifts are used. This issue's Annual Report story offers some highlights of 2012 – most notably that the value of charity care, adjustments and write-offs was up 13% over 2011 and totaled a record \$1,150,253. For the same time period, our combined total expense by type were: program services – 78%, management and general – 19%, and fundraising 3%.

It is only through the generous support of our community that we have been able to provide skilled, compassionate care to the nearly 26,000 patients who have chosen Center for Hospice Care over the past 33 years. We offer our heart-felt thanks on their behalf.

29th Annual Helping Hands Award Dinner Celebrates Life

Honoring Ann Manion, Volunteer President of Women's Care Center

On a perfect May Day evening, more than 500 guests gathered at the Hilton Garden Inn to celebrate Ann Manion, president of Women's Care Center and recipient of this year's Helping Hands Award. The award honors a member of the communities served by Center for Hospice Care for his or her leadership, commitment to service and volunteerism. During her tenure as volunteer president, the Women's Care Center has grown into the nation's largest pregnancy resource center with 17 sites in Indiana, Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin as well as four licensee centers in Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin and Minnesota.

Proceeds from the event provide financial assistance to support Center for Hospice Care's ongoing mission to provide skilled, compassionate care to those facing life-limiting illnesses, regardless of their ability to pay. This year, the event raised \$221,220 to benefit Center for Hospice Care; this brought the total of funds raised in 29 years to \$2,996,008.

The chairs for this year's event were Kitty and Tim Fulnecky. The theme, "Celebrate Life," was chosen to honor both Center for Hospice Care and Ann's work with Women's Care Center. The festive pink and white ribbon-draped maypole, blossoming tulips and

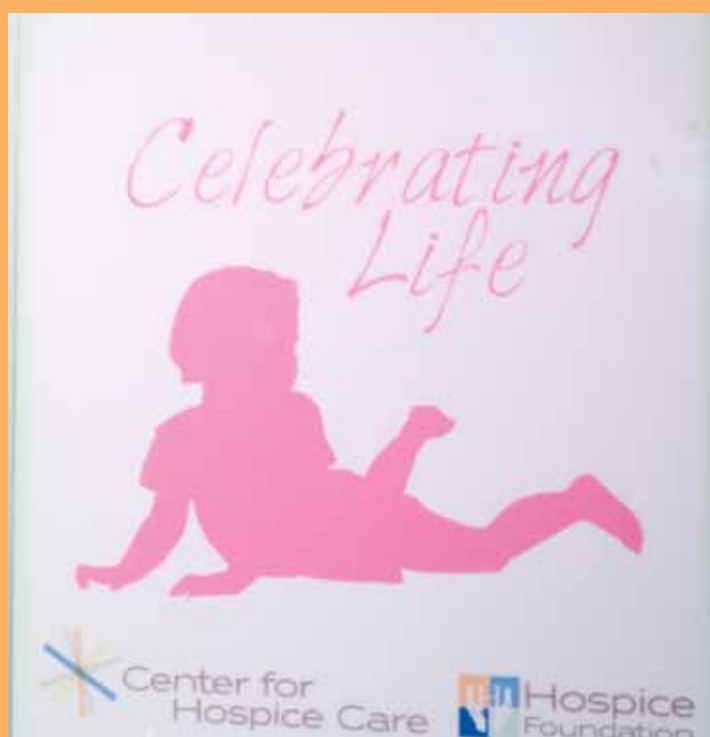

Center for Hospice Care Celebrates its Volunteers

We couldn't do what we do without them... Center for Hospice Care's dedicated, trained community volunteers make a tremendous difference in the organization and in the lives of the patients and families we serve. Last year they gave 16,744 hours of their time to CHC, traveling throughout our eight-county service area to patient homes, nursing homes and other extended care facilities, as well as our own Hospice Houses, driving a total of 39,195 miles. Many of them work from one of our CHC offices assisting with office and other tasks. In 2012, they saved CHC \$383,134 in expenses.

To honor their dedication, CHC hosted the annual Volunteer Recognition and Annual Report luncheon on April 16th at the Hilton Garden Inn. One of the highlights of the lunch is the presentation of the John E. Krueger Hospice Caring Award. This award is given annually to the volunteer who exemplifies his commitment to CHC and its mission. The 2013 recipient was Joyce Carver a nine-year

volunteer from Elkhart. In 2012 alone, Joyce volunteered more than 200 hours, while driving more than 1,000 miles to serve Center for Hospice Care patients.

Joyce received four nominations from staff at CHC. One nomination stated, "I nominate Joyce not just for her willingness to serve, but for the passion that she has for our hospice patients. She has a passion and a heart that shows love unconditionally." Kim Sanders, RN, who works with Joyce in the Elkhart Hospice House, said that Joyce provides comfort to our patients during care by listening to them or their families. "Joyce brings a smile to the day when she is in her volunteer position." Kim continued, "She truly makes the Elkhart Hospice House a peaceful place to be." Danielle Stilley, RN, Hospice House Coordinator, said that Joyce is always cheery and positive. "As a team, when we see Joyce, we can't help but smile," noted Danielle.

Elkhart Memorial Dedication Honors Loved Ones

Since opening the doors to the Elkhart facility in 2008, more than 1,000 patients and their loved ones have experienced compassionate, specialized care in a warm, home-like setting situated on 11 acres. The setting also includes a serene outdoor area that includes a running water feature, winding brick walkway, seating areas, benches and walking trail that all come together to create a tranquil environment, with the sights and sounds of nature close by.

The outdoor living areas of the campus not only give patients and their families the chance to relax in solitude or to enjoy one other's company in a natural setting but also provide a way for families to honor the memory of a loved one who was a Center for Hospice Care (CHC) patient with a memorial item – which include bricks, benches, evergreen and flowering trees – in the Garden of Remembrance and Renewal on the Elkhart campus.

To celebrate the lives of loved ones and dedicate new memorial items, the first Tuesday of June each year has been designated for a remembrance and dedication ceremony. This year's ceremony was held on June 4 with over 50 people attending. More than simply an unveiling of donated memorial items, it is a chance for donors and families to gather and reflect on the life of the person honored by the gift. The gathering also allows them to see how

each item adds to the beauty of the Garden of Remembrance and Renewal.

This year's ceremony began with an introduction by Hospice Foundation COO, Mike Wargo. He was followed by CHC President/CEO Mark Murray, who gave a brief overview of the services offered by CHC along with an update of how CHC has served the community in the past year. Bereavement Counselor Greg Suderman wrapped up the ceremony by noting how important events like this are for the grieving process. Suderman then led the crowd in a responsive reading, "We Remember Them."

New memorial items donated by December 31, 2013 will be installed in the spring of 2014 and dedicated next June. 2012 Annual Report

Thanks to the ongoing support from donors and many healthcare entities throughout our eight-county service area, 2012 was another successful year for Center for Hospice Care (CHC). CHC served more patients last year than in any year in our history. 1,866 patients and their families choose CHC for their care during 2012. By annualized numbers of patients served, CHC continues to rank in the top 5% of hospice programs operating in the United States.

We are delighted with our locally unmatched clinical expertise. In 2012, a third staff physician joined our expert team of medical specialists. Under the American Board of Medical Specialty, there are approximately 6,487 Board Certified Hospice and Palliative Medicine physicians in the nation. Three of them work fulltime and exclusively at CHC.

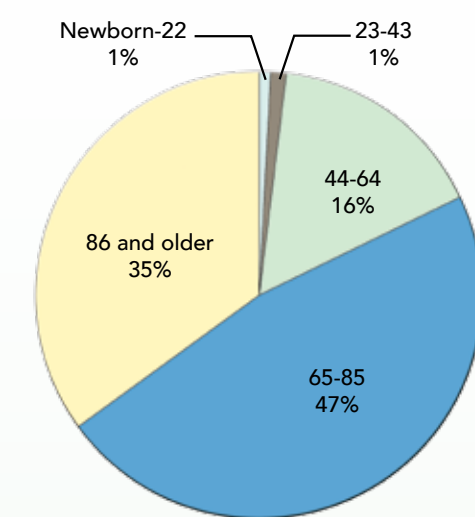
Our dedicated, trained community volunteers contribute to CHC in many ways. Last

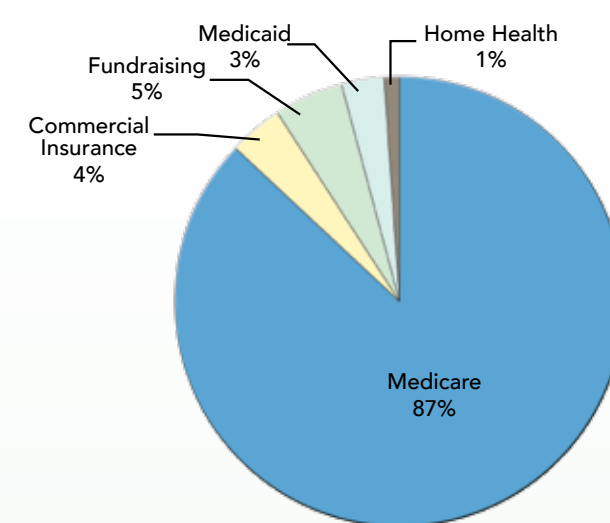
other duties. Volunteers saved the agency \$383,134 in expenses during 2012. A very big thank you to our hospice volunteers!

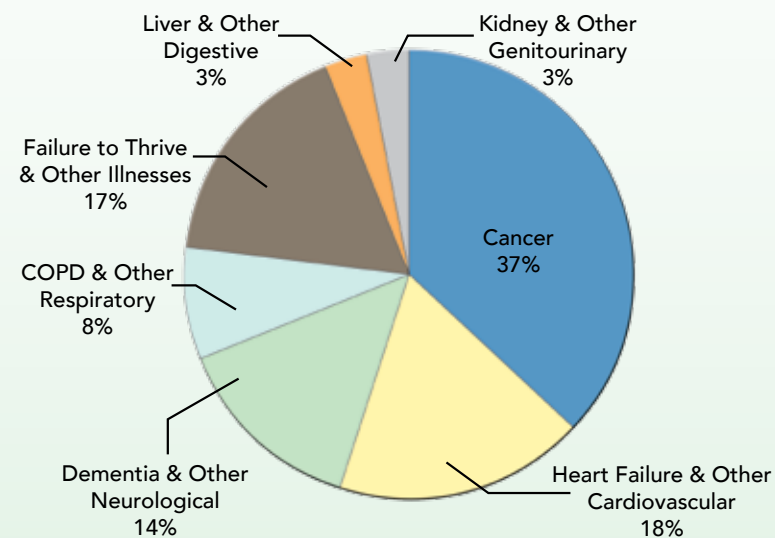
Patients by Age



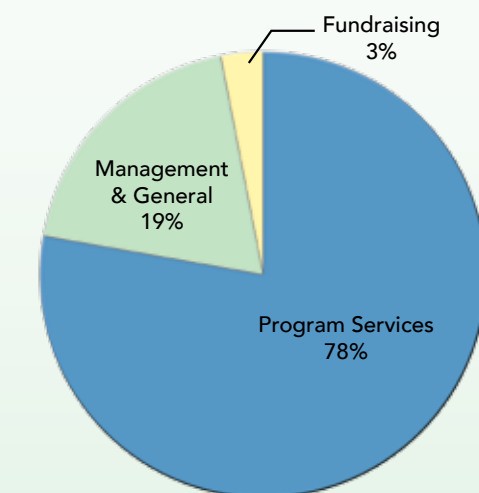
Total Revenue by Type



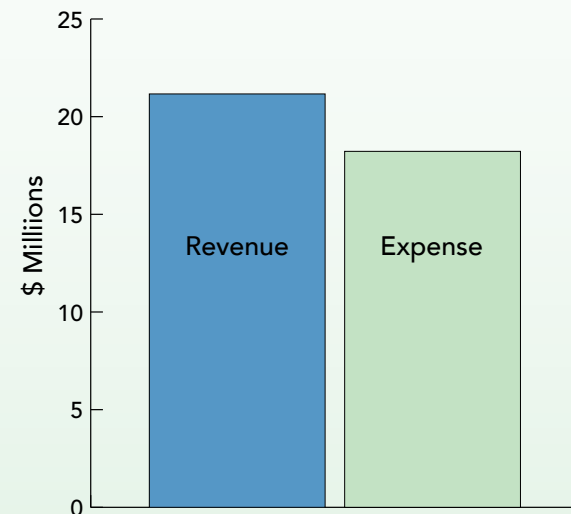
Patients by Diagnosis

Total Revenue vs. Total Expenses



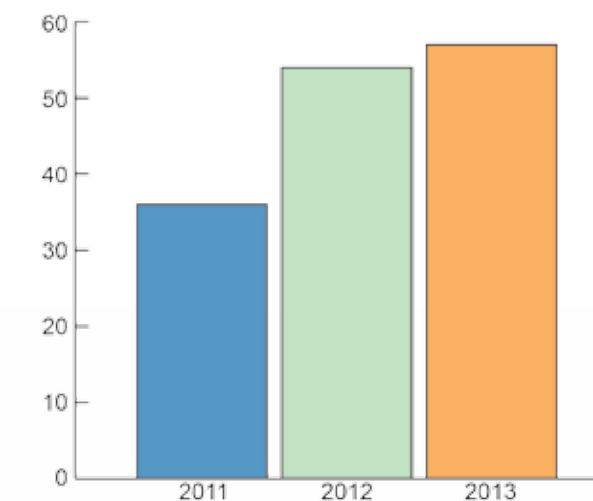

Camp Evergreen Celebrates 20 Years

Going to camp is a rite of passage of American youngsters – time spent swimming, around campfires, doing crafts and sports and horseback riding become cherished memories. Camp Evergreen, Center for Hospice Care’s grief camp for youth and teens, fulfills all those and more.

It is the only camp of its kind in Northern Indiana, a place for grieving children and teens who have suffered the loss of a significant person in their life. It’s a place they can talk about the death of someone they love, their feelings and learn how to deal effectively with their grief.

For teens, the camp also offers team- and confidence-building activities that help facilitate the healing process. The ropes course, stretched out in the woods high above the ground, seems like a daunting task... much like the grief they’re facing. With encouragement and coaching, campers make it through the course with a new realization of how strong and resourceful they are.

This summer marks a milestone for Camp Evergreen. “We celebrated our 20th camp this summer,” said Camp Director, Holly Farmer, MA, LMHC. “We are actually seeing former campers coming back to volunteer as a Camp Buddy – it’s come full-circle.”

According to Farmer, this year’s camp hosted a total 45 campers, 17 teens and 28 youth, along with 72 volunteers and CHC staff members. In the camp’s 20-year history, it has served 738 teens and youth in the community and trained 488 adults. Since 2006, the volunteers have put in over 8,700 hours and traveled over 39,800 miles for Camp Evergreen.

Camp Evergreen, sponsored by Center for Hospice Care, is provided free to all campers as a community service. Transportation to and from camp is included. Campers and volunteers must complete an application packet to participate in camp. Center for Hospice Care President/CEO Visits Original Hospice Facility

Mark Murray, President / CEO of Center for Hospice Care recently returned from a trip to London, England for a National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization (NHPCO) Board of Directors meeting. Joint international board meetings with NHPCO and Help the Hospices (the U.K. version of NHPCO) took place during that time. He served a two-year term as the Chairman of the Board of Directors for NHPCO from January 2011 through December 2012; he is currently immediate past chair of the organization. Following are his observations of the trip:

“It was a sincere honor to have the opportunity to meet with the Board of Directors of the United Kingdom’s version of NHPCO and explore our differences, our many similarities, and of course our passion for the hospice mission. The hospice movement started in London in 1967 by Dame Cicely Saunders. So having the chance to tour St. Christopher’s

Hospice where it all began was a humbling experience. Saunders died in 2005 as a patient of the hospice she founded, under the specialized form of healthcare she invented. She insisted on no ‘flashy’ memorials and her ashes are buried in a courtyard at St. Christopher’s under a very small, essentially hidden stone with the simple inscription of her first name and that of her husband Marian.

“I was most surprised to learn that in Great Britain where hospice was born, even with government-sponsored universal healthcare where everybody has free access, only one-third of the cost of hospice is paid for by the UK’s National Health Service. Each hospice program must make up two-thirds of their budget through donations and fundraising. It makes what we have with Medicare look superb and the British hospice administrators freely admit they are envious of how hospice works in America.”

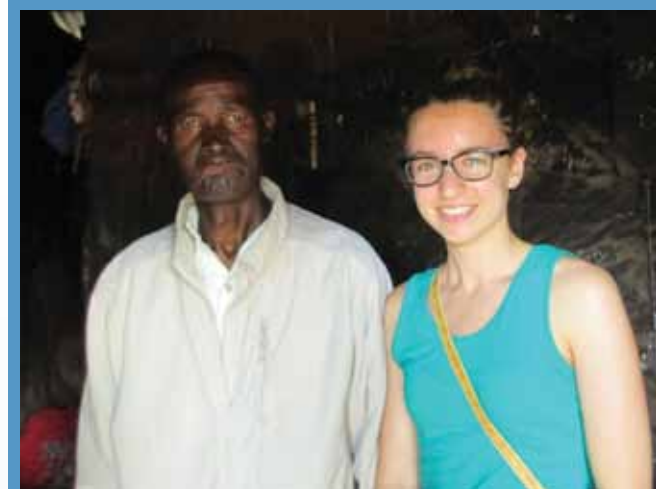

The Midwest's Best Ride in its Fifth Year

Thanks to a very dedicated group of volunteers and cycling enthusiasts, Bike Michiana for Hospice has earned the reputation of being the Midwest's best organized ride. The ride takes advantage of some of the Midwest's finest scenery – including Michigan's orchard and vineyard areas. Cyclists who have participated in the first four events have raved about the quiet, scenic roads that wind through some of the best bike terrain around.

The ride also features:

- Six Scenic Courses: the routes include a family ride of 10 miles, plus 25 miles, 40 miles, 100K, and our century ride. For the especially adventurous, there's a one-of-a-kind

200K that takes riders from South Bend to Weko Beach on the shores of Lake Michigan and back.

- Incredible SAGs: Each of the SAG stops are sponsored by local favorites like Indulgence Pastry Shop, Yesterday's, Moser's Austrian Café, Fiddler's Hearth, Grand Mere Inn and Corndance Cafe.

- Outstanding Volunteers: Their passion for the event and the sport of cycling is evident in their efforts to give every rider a first-class experience.

- Ideal Ride: No matter whether your style is a leisurely ride along one of our shorter routes or putting in a full 100 miles, we have a suitable route.



Perhaps most importantly, proceeds from the ride benefit two local organizations devoted to making the most of living: Center for Hospice Care and the Bike Michiana Coalition.

Cyclists can also raise money for the Hospice Foundation by asking family and friends to pledge their support. 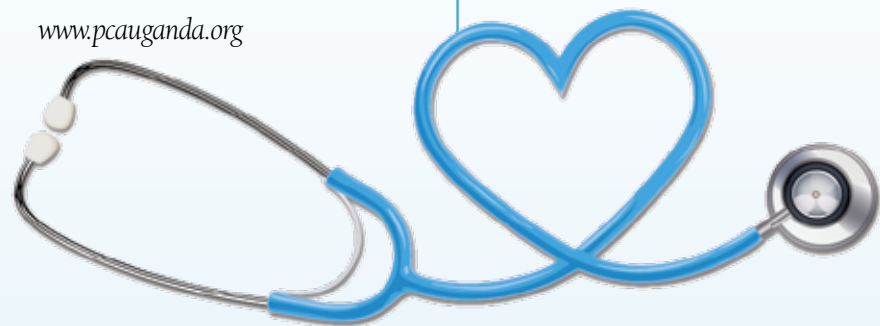

Center for Hospice Care and PCAU Receive the Third Annual FHSSA Global Partnership Award

Great partnerships can achieve results that individual efforts alone can't match. The five-year partnership between Center for Hospice Care and the Palliative Care Association of Uganda was recently lauded for their achievements with the awarding of the third annual FHSSA Global Partnership Award. FHSSA, formerly the Foundation for Hospices in Sub-Saharan Africa, builds partnerships to enhance compassionate care in Africa. The award was presented at the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization's (NHPCO) Management and Leadership Conference, held in April in Maryland.

The Global Partnership Award recognizes the outstanding efforts of a partner that went above and beyond the expectations of a partnership. The award winner is selected based on creativity in fundraising, partner collaboration, staff contribution and commitment, and community outreach and involvement. The award comes with a \$500 donation to the African hospice partner.

"Center for Hospice Care/Hospice Foundation has shown what a tremendous impact one partnership can have. The

creativity and commitment they have made to the Palliative Care Association of Uganda will have a lasting effect on the patients and families needing palliative care and also to the dedicated health care workers who work tirelessly with limited resources to provide that care," said John Mastrojohn, executive director of FHSSA.

Center for Hospice Care/Hospice Foundation raised over \$25,000 in 2012 to support the work of PCAU to bring palliative care to all in Uganda. The review committee was impressed with CHC/HF's award application on many levels ranging from our unique and creative fundraising efforts, to our involvement in advocacy efforts on the national level in Uganda, to our dedication to finding a new home for PCAU headquarters, to our support of scholarship funds.

"Our FHSSA partnership has been rewarding and meaningful for our staff, our board



and our volunteers. It has been our privilege to be partnered with PCAU. But it's so much more than a partnership. For us, faraway places have come closer, the planet has become smaller, and our own hospice family has grown in the best ways possible," said Mark Murray, President/CEO of CHC/HF.

Mike Wargo, COO of Hospice Foundation noted, "It's been said that pain knows no boundaries. Through our partnership with PCAU and through making our film *Okuyamba* available as an education and fundraising tool, we have also found that compassion and caring know no boundaries."

Interns Learn About Palliative Care an Ocean Away

Through our relationships with various organizations at the University of Notre Dame, including the Kellogg Institute for International Studies and the Ford Family Program, Center for Hospice Care and Hospice Foundation have facilitated internships for three students in Uganda this summer. Placement of each student was made by the Palliative Care Association of Uganda (PCAU) taking into account each student's area of study and interests. The 2013 interns are:

Gaby Austgen is a MS student in Global Health at the University of Notre Dame's Eck Institute for Global Health. While in Uganda, she helped in structuring a national palliative care audit (including the framework for monitoring and evaluation) as well as identifying methodologies, research tools, work plans and the establishment of prompt updating of palliative care data. She worked with the Mulago Palliative Care Unit, which offers palliative care to patients and families from a national referral hospital and national cancer center. Her internship lasted from May 21st until July 6th.

Anna Heffron is an honor's student with majors in biochemistry and philosophy. She has a minor in Glynn Family Honors program of University of Notre Dame. While in Uganda, Anna undertook a research project, comparing the practice of palliative care delivery in Uganda to practices in the United States. She worked at Hospice Jinja,

which coordinates services around the Busoga region. Its team visits and networks with five hospitals in the region. It also has out-reach clinic programs near remote villages. Anna's internship was from June 4th until July 30th.

Emmie Mediate is a junior minoring in International Development Studies with a Africana Studies and Pre-Medicine double major at the University of Notre Dame's Kellogg Institute for International Studies. Emmie visited Uganda for the second time, having spent some time last summer in Hoima and Gulu doing research. She fell in love with the country and says returning to Uganda and doing an internship revived the beautiful memories she has of the country. While in Uganda she furthered her understanding of Ugandan healthcare. Her interests include maternal health and establishing how poverty affects health care in Uganda. She is working at Kawempe Home Care, a PCAU community-based member organization that provides holistic home care to people living with TB, HIV/AIDS and or cancer. She was in Uganda from June 2nd until August 4th.

Gaby, Anna and Emmie relayed their experiences to friends, family and Hospice Foundation supporters via their blogs. Beyond their work in hospice and palliative care settings, they also were able to enjoy soccer, whitewater rafting and sightseeing throughout the country.



Building a Strong Foundation

Two Organizations, One Mission

In 33 years Center for Hospice Care (CHC) has evolved from a small organization that provided hospice care to a single county to one that ranks in the top 5% of all hospice programs in America in terms of numbers of patients served. Today CHC services eight counties in Northern Indiana, with facilities in three counties. Since the first patient was admitted in January 1980 through June 30th of this year, CHC has served 25,647 patients on an annually added basis.

When CHC opened its doors in 1980, it made a promise that no person eligible for hospice services would ever be turned away for financial reasons. It's a promise that is taken very seriously. Most

non-profit organizations have development departments charged with raising funds for needs such as this. For many years, Center for Hospice Care operated on that model. But as we grew and our mission broadened to include other educational and advocacy issues, a new model became necessary.

In 2008, Hospice Foundation was formed to support the work of Center for Hospice Care and to engage in activities that encourage awareness of hospice, palliative care and end-of-life issues in our eight-county service area, across the country and around the world. That change dovetailed with Center for Hospice Care's updated name and logo.

As any marketing guru will say, "branding is everything." And in branding, the first thing most people think about is the name and logo. In 2010, Center for Hospice Care introduced its new logo and tagline, "choices to make the most of life," as part of a comprehensive community awareness and education campaign. It was easier to remember than the previous name (Center for Hospice and Palliative Care). An extensive advertising and marketing campaign has helped increase name recognition as well as increased awareness about key elements of hospice care, such as the fact that there is a six-month Medicare hospice benefit for qualifying patients and that hospice care

Our visual identity has been designed to reflect this by incorporating CHC logo colors and typefaces while linking to the organizations' shared history of helping hands.

is available for any serious, life-limiting illness, not just cancer.

The Hospice Foundation logo reflects both Center for Hospice Care's history and the foundation's four mission areas. It has its roots in the original Center for Hospice and Palliative Care corporate identity, which prominently featured the helping hands. The logo colors of light and dark blue were the original logo colors as well. The yellow and orange were taken from the updated CHC logo.

The four squares and associated colors represent the four mission areas of the Hospice Foundation: fundraising, stewardship, education and collaboration. Fundraising is typical of most foundations and we are fortunate to have the support of our very generous community. One

of the fundamental reasons for our fundraising is to provide services to patients and families who are uninsured or have no ability to pay for their care. Memorial gifts, donations and events (such as the Helping Hands Award Dinner, Walk for Hospice and Bike Michiana for Hospice) account for the majority of these funds.

We take our job of being good stewards of the donations entrusted to us very seriously. The importance of trust is never more visible for a not-for-profit organization than when it comes to how it spends its money. Our Annual Report is available online at foundationforhospice.org and is sent to numerous donors in the mail. We also provide a highlight of our year in Crossroads – it appears in this issue in fact.

Collaborative efforts include supporting the partnership between Center for Hospice Care and the Palliative Care Association of Uganda as well as working closely with local, regional and national organizations such as the University of Notre Dame and the National Hospice Foundation to advance hospice and palliative care knowledge and education.

Both Center for Hospice Care and Hospice Foundation are here because we are committed to improving the quality of living. It's reflected in the work we do separately and jointly. A strong foundation, based on sound fiscal policies and outstanding service, helps us ensure that we will be here to provide compassionate care for future generations.

Donor Profile: Ernestine “Kelley” Kelsey

“Give of your time, your treasure and your talents,” has been a long-standing tenet of philanthropy. Ernestine “Kelley” Kelsey is one of Center for Hospice Care’s longest standing philanthropic supporters whose background with the organization includes each of these tenets. In 1980, the first year of seeing patients, Kelsey assisted with spiritual counseling. “I think there were about eight patients that first year,” she noted. “The hospice movement was just starting to come together then and in the South Bend area it was cohesive enough to begin a hospice organization here.”

The holistic, yet practical, approach offered by the hospice movement is part of what drew her to become involved. “The philosophy of hospice goes far beyond the usual health care approach,” she said. “It’s more humanitarian, more spiritual, not just about the dollars. If we truly believe in love, how can we deny help to anyone, to our brothers and our sisters? I appreciated the fact that hospice care

was available to everyone. I believe that we are created in God’s image and are called to embody the Divine’s love regardless of color, age or anything else.”

Her support of Center for Hospice Care has continued in other ways. Kelsey is one of the organization’s longest-standing donors, making a gift to CHC every year since 1994. “Since I wasn’t able to be there physically, I wanted to contribute in other ways,” she said.

The hospice movement is one example of the causes Kelsey has championed. Before the first Earth Day in 1970, she and other area residents organized a group called PoP or “Protect our Planet.” She was also involved in helping organize the area’s League of Women Voters. She found herself drawn in other spiritual pursuits as well. “I realized that being a private, contemplative person I needed something else,” she said. This quest led her to pursuits that focus on raising the consciousness of human kind.

She describes her younger self as “a shy girl from the South” who went to study at the University of Stuttgart in the 1960s searching to connect with others whose ideas and values resonated with hers. She returned to the US – specifically the South Bend area – in 1967 when her husband, Sydney, was invited to be a visiting professor at the University of Notre Dame. Eventually he became professor emeritus of civil engineering at the university. “He was the head, the intellectual,” she said. “I was the spiritual. We didn’t really understand where the other was coming from but we were able to make it work.”

They shared a love of gardening and today, a year and a half after his death, friends and neighbors care for the lovely garden area behind her home. Health issues keep her from being able to enjoy gardening; she is quick to point out, however, how blessed she is. “Getting in touch with my gratitude is important,” she said. “I have been very blessed in this life. I reflect on this every day.”

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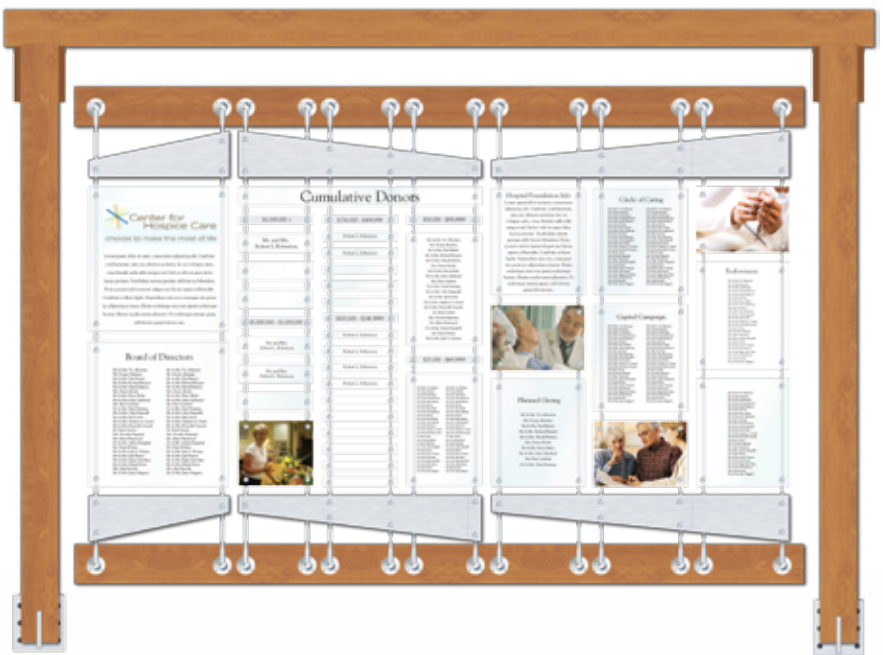
